






3. Class attendance was necessary for learning course material.






## How would you rate this course overall?





## How would you rate this instructor overall as a teacher?





## Comments for TH16108\_2014F THE RELIGIOUS QUEST I - Jillian Maxey

### What are the strengths of this course?

#### Comment

Professor Maxey is incredibly passionate about the subject matter and this comes through in the lectures. The course is also well-structured and the order of topics covered made perfect sense.

The greatest strength of this course was Professor Maxey herself.

Professor Maxey did a wonderful job presenting the foundations of the Christian and Jewish religions. The readings were interesting, and the assignments were helpful in gaining knowledge about the religions, such as the synagogue and church visits. I liked working with a group throughout the semester, as it gave me different perspectives on the readings. Also, Professor Maxey kept the class engaged in discussion, which helped foster a comfortable community for people sharing about their religious differences. The final project, analyzing a work depicting Jesus' crucifixion from both a Christian and Jewish perspective, was especially interesting.

The sources from which the course drew were varied and engaging, allowing the students to develop their own perspectives on the course's major themes. As both an introductory and comparative theology course, Religious Quest succeeded by exposing the students to materials that engaged the courses major themes and questions from many perspectives. Professor Maxey responds to her students' ideas with thoughtful questions and comments that promote further insight and deeper understanding. Professor Maxey promotes diversity of opinion in discussion and in written work, encouraging students to develop and refine their own perspectives on texts and larger themes.

Professor is very excited about the topics! Provides many resources, and a wide variety of readings. Pushes you to experience faith outside of BC---with a synaouge visit that left a strong impression on me. Breaks the class into groups for the entire semester--was able to meet some incredible people. Faciltates discussion--does not let the same people talk over and over again. Leaves time for questions. Has a bubbly attitude that makes the class exciting instead of somber.

#### Very interesting information

Professor Maxey is a wonderful professor. I really appreciated her immense knowledge and enthusiasm for the subject matter -- it really helped spark interest in the material, as well as motivate me to do well on the assignments. I found all the readings applicable to the subject matter. Of course, some readings are hard to get through but Professor Maxey does a great job of going over them in the next class. Additionally, I really enjoyed the visits to Synagogue and Church. I've been to Church plenty of times, so that wasn't as exciting, but without this course I don't think I would have ever attended services at a Synagogue. I really enjoyed that experience!

This course is very thought-provoking, class discussions were very helpful, and the readings that supported the class material was very interesting. Also, the group projects and site visits made learning about other religions more interactive and applicable.

The course covers all aspects of Christian-Jewish relations both past and present giving full knowledge on the topic set out to be taught.

## How could the instructor improve the course?

#### Comment

It does not need any major improvements. The only minor tweak is that some of the readings assigned out of class were too long and I therefore had a lot of trouble concentrating and retaining the information . One example was when we were assigned nearly all of Genesis for one class

Group presentations work well, but having more than two students working together on a single paper, especially for a final grade, is not the best assessment. I would have suggested having each student write their own, smaller paper, after the presentation.

I felt having a group paper at the end of the semester was kind of tricky. Maybe in the future students can write an individual paper on their section of the powerpoint. Also having one more graded paper in the semester would be nice.

More group discussion. The classroom was horrible for stirring up group discussion (help the woman out)

The readings were often too long. Long assignments would be given and only portions would be discussed. Simplifying the reading by cutting it down a bit would be helpful and (I think) garner more interest in completing the assignments necessary to learn the material.

Although this is a core class, I thought much of the material was pretty basic for those with a strong background in Christianity or Judaism. It gave a nice foundation, but I felt it could have gone a little more in depth. Also, there was often a large amount of reading for one day, and I felt it was hard to prepare all of the reading in between classes well enough to be able to discuss it fully during class.

Some readings were not discussed and seemed almost unnecessary.

The powerpoints can sometimes include an excess of information---the use of bulletin points would be less overhwhelming. For a core class, the workload is extreme. Typed reflections every night on the reading, a midterm, a final presentation, and a final 25 page paper. However, I will say that being intesrted in this course---I did not mind the workload.

#### Comment

This course is a great option for core: the inter-religious dialogue was much more engaging for me than a traditional Christian Theology course

Absolutely - Professor Maxey encourages her students to think about religion (most often considered taboo)

Please comment on the assigned reading for the course (The introductory essays on religion, the Bible, Goldberg, Irreconcilable Differences? and Seeing Judaism Anew). Which books, articles and/or authors did you find helpful? Would you recommend they be assigned again?

#### Comment

I enjoyed all of the readings and found them helpful, except for when we had to read all of Genesis for one class period. That made it very difficult to retain the text. In other instances, there were other readings (mostly the master story analytical essays) that I had a similar difficulty with because of their length and density.

All works served the course well, especially Goldberg.

Yes - gave insight into what religion/Christianity/Judaism are from the perspective of religious scholars

Goldberg was thick but useful.

The readings were interesting, many of them were much too long.

I think Goldberg was very helpful out of all of the assigned reading. It illustrated the central themes of the course and was a good introduction into theological analysis.

Goldberg was very interesting and helpful breaking down the bible.

Goldberg was great and clear, made us think. Didn't like the play, all other books were very useful and elaborated further on what she taught in class.

I thought the readings from the Bible and Goldberg, especially reading them side by side, were helpful. The introductory essays on religion helped provide a foundation in the class, and I would recommend the be assigned again. The readings from Irreconcilable Differences and Seeing Judaism Anew were not as essential to the class, but there were helpful in analyzing Christian and Jewish relations more in depth, and they helped stimulate discussion in class.

Some essays seemed to be too esoteric for an introductory course, but most were relevant and engaging. Golderg's book was the most interesting and was a great companion to the Bible. I would definitely recommend those to be assigned again. Seeing Judaism Anew and Irreconcilable Differences were relevant to course material, but were not as engaging. Still they were good to read.

Loved Goldberg! Awesome ideas and thoughts that provoked great discussion in class. Parts of SJA were important. The intro essays were inspiring but perhpas not 100% neccesary.

The introductory essays on religion were really helpful and gave me the background I needed to better understand what we talked about in class. I really liked Goldberg's readings -- they helped me understand the readings from the Bible. Irreconcilable Differences was easy to enjoy and learn from as well. They went over the content clearly and were very insightful, especially to someone who doesn't know too much about Judaism and Christian-Jewish Relations. Some of the

longer/older articles/readings were hard to get through. I think that when there is a 20 page article, there should only be one assigned for that corresponding class.

I found the assigned readings very helpful, except some of the Jewish texts were confusing. Although in class everything was explained.

I really enjoyed reading from the Bible. The other articles in this section were a little long for the points they were trying to make.

Besides the bible, none of them were interesting, just boring and time-consuming.

I thought these were good choices for this class.

Please comment, specifically, on the play we read about Abraham Heschel and Cardinal Bea in Religious Differences Between Artichokes. Did this enhance the other materials and discussions in the course? Did you learn anything new or different that you don't think you would have otherwise? Would you recommend that it be assigned again?

#### Comment

I enjoyed the play, but due to the negative reactions to it from important religious figures, it wasn't credible in my eyes. I would not recommend that it be assigned again.

Perhaps it will play a greater role in the second semester of this course, but the play felt a tad out of place, and almost tacked onto the end of the unit.

I enjoyed having a large discussion after reading the play instead writing a response paper. Allowed students to bounce ideas off of one another - also we read this play later on in the semester so students were familiar with one another.

#### Not really desirable

I really enjoyed reading this play and analyzing it in class. I wish we worked with the other materials in this way.

I think it was good to show the nuances and challenges of inter-religious dialogue. However, I think perhaps the class didn't fully understand the arguments Bea and Heschel were putting forward and the discussion never really clarified their positions.

I thought it made a minimal difference.

I thought Religious Differences Between Artichokes was very interesting, and I enjoyed reading it. It gave me a new perspective on the history of Christian-Jewish relations, and I thought it particularly interesting after reading Nostra Aetate. I would recommend that it be assigned again.

RDBA was a great way to bring Christianity and Judaism into a conversation about their places in modernity. It's an easy ready that develops insight on the human, rather than theological or theoretical level.

#### Comment

I thought there was a great balance of assignments, between papers, exams, and a public speaking component. I wouldn't make any changes in this category

I would add another paper in addition to the personal identity essay.

I thought it was a fair amount of work, though a bit more than other classes from what I heard.

The reading responses definitely made you do the reading, and it was interesting to reflect on the context of the reading in the whole of the class.

I thought the assignments were sufficient. The midterm was long and challenging to finish (Part 1) but overall I think it was good.

i loved the genesis narrative

I loved the personal identity essay and the final project. However, I think you should emphasize the necessity to be able to talk about everything we're learning in class in specific ways. Maybe give a list of 50 terms for identifications (midterm) and put a certain amount on the midterm. I thought it was really open-ended

I thought there were a lot of reading responses due throughout the semester, and I would subtract some of these. They weren't helpful in reading the material closely, and I felt like I was often struggling to find something to say in my reflections. I would subtract some of these and focus more on discussing the texts in class. The essays and midterm were reasonable, and I might add another essay instead of doing the many short reflections during the semester.

The Genesis narrative was a good assignment, though the instructions were easy to misinterpret. Reading responses, though a little time consuming, were good for developing the students' thoughts. Professor Maxey responded to the papers critically and encouraged further exploration.

The reflections should be changed to every other night! The midterm and Essay were great and totally manageable

I really liked the assignments

I think the reading responses were very helpful for this course, as well as the essay and midterm. I wouldn't subtract any types of assignments.

I would definitely add more major essays to the class and eliminate the constant reflections.

I would remove a few of the reading responses, make them once a week instead of every day. Also, it would be helpful is the instructions for the long essays were more concise. The directions were several pages and I had trouble pin pointing the exact question and trying to figure out how to address all of the parts

I thought the narratives were fine and were not that difficult to do. The reading responses sometimes got repetitive in doing a lot of them, but i found they helped in reflecting your thoughts and the midterm was cool in how we did two parts, it made it easier to take. I liked that.

All the long assignments were good and fair. Reading responses asked the same question every time

I actually really liked the assignments for the course. The Genesis narrative/personal identity essay was a nice way for me to think about what has influenced me in life. The midterm was very fair and I feel like I was well prepared for it. The reading responses were also helpful for me to think about what I had read and I liked that I was given feedback on my responses.

Writing the Genesis Narrative was actually an enjoyable experience. In all my other classes, I've never had to include my own personal experience in an essay. As I mentioned earlier, I thought the reading responses were redundant. It obviously gets the students to read the readings, but it got bothersome by the end. The midterm was a fair test, but there was not nearly enough time for the first component. That much writing in only 50 minutes was way too much. It should definitely be cut down for next time.

The Genesis narrative and personal identity essay were very interesting. I had a hard time with the reading responses because I am so familiar with Christianity that I often didn't have much of a response to give.

They were all fair and none were too tedious.

I think all of these assignments were very useful. They especially make one think about religion in relation to oneself.

#### Comment

I enjoyed working with a group. You learn so much more when collaborating on something than doing the work on your own.

I very much enjoyed working in a group - the group presentation definitely took time to put together but it was nice to collaborate with other students/it was fun to present in front of the class! I thought putting the group paper together was tricky - maybe in the future the final paper could be individual-based and reflect what each student did in the powerpoint persentation.

The final project VERY MUCH was a capstone to the material and discussions, I had a good group though.

The group project was definitely a learning-experience. Writing at such a long paper with a group of people isn't easy but its practical in terms of what will be required of us outside of college. I was lucky and got a group I really fit with, but I know some other groups were discontent with the people they had to work with.

I think it was an interesting way to present the material and allowed us to analyze works that are perhaps more interesting or tailored to our desires. Group projects have their pros and cons but because I had a generally positive experience with it I think it was a good capstone of the course.
